





# Why we do this work

### EVERY 12 MINUTES SOMEONE IN AMERICA DIES FROM AN OPIOID OVERDOSE.

### California in 2017:

- 2,196 opioid overdose deaths
- 429 Fentanyl overdose deaths (57% increase from 2016)
- 4,281 opioid overdose ED visits
- 21,787,042 opioid prescriptions


#### **The Accelerator Program**

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

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
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

# What are we doing to get to zero overdose deaths?



A Center of the Public Health Institute PREVENT new starts (safer prescribing; upstream prevention and education)

MANAGE pain safely (alternative pain therapies; tapering)

TREAT addiction (access to medication assisted treatment in jails, primary care, hospitals and EDs)

STOP overdose deaths (harm reduction via naloxone and syringe exchanges)



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### Lowered opioid supply:

**IMPACT** 

- 80 urgent care centers engaged to implement safe prescribing guidelines in Los Angeles County
- 64 pounds of medication collected through takeback program in Mendocino County

### **Increased access to treatment:**

• 29 physicians and allied health professionals trained to prescribe buprenorphine in Alameda and Contra Costa Counties

### **Prevented overdose deaths:**

 100 overdoses reversed by law enforcement in Placer and Nevada Counties


